Glaðligr Jól! Happy Yule!

It's Christmas time and many of us have traditions that follow down through the years, sometimes we create our own. In our society many of us may be interested in how our persona would have celebrated this season.

As a viking persona, and someone of primarily Norse descent, I have a mixture of things that get passed down through the centuries, and some I looked up. Viking culture predates its introduction to Christianity, and therefore the Christmas or Christ Mass meaning that was brought to the culture in later centuries. There are many traditions, so I am just going to talk about Yule trees and wreaths. Like many Germanic cultures, they celebrated the longest night and had different traditions that may have inspired some of our current traditions, such as decorating a tree. While we may decorate trees for many reasons, the Vikings used to hang wooden figurines to represent the old gods, food and clothing from the evergreens. They hoped that by doing this they could tempt the gods to come back and return spring to the frozen land. They also used branches to hang above their windows and doors as they believed evergreens warded off evil.

This is a belief that is seen through many different cultures and similar to Christmas wreaths. Where the Vikings differ with Yule wreaths is they light them on fire! Yes, bring on the pyromaniacs, light them on fire. The reason for this according to a couple sources is they would light the wreath on fire to symbolize the returning of the sun and the lengthening of the days. While I might not encourage the lighting of the wreath (fire safety is important) I do wish everyone a joyous holiday, merry Christmas and Glaðligr Jól.

THE CONQUISTADORS AND "THE FIRST THANKSGIVING?"

A brief history of the Conquistadors' culinary journey through the interior of modern day Mexico, part one.

In 1519, Hernán Cortés de Monroy y Pizarro Altamirano and his men landed on the Yucatan Peninsula in Mayan territory.

There he encountered Geronimo de Aguilar. Geronimo de Aguilar learned the Chontal Maya language and was able to translate for Cortés as they moved into the Tabasco region of what is known today as Mexico.

* Geronimo de Aguilar was stranded in the Yucatan from an earlier voyage into the region. On their march towards Tenochtitlan, the Aztec capital, known today as Mexico City, the Spaniards were introduced to tortillas, "Tlaxcalli" in the Nahuatl language, in the town of Coyoacán, in November of 1519.

Bernal Díaz del Castillo documented a feast hosted by Hernán Cortés in Coyoacán, which included foods served in corn tortillas.

Bernal Diaz's account would mark the first Thanksgiving in the New World as an exchange of foods, culture, and an alliance was formed with the people of Coyoacán.

It is documented that tortillas, turkey, "Huehxolotl," and salsa, "Chilmolli," were introduced to the Spanish at this feast.

A typical corn tortilla of the period would have been made much like the tortillas of today.


A simple tortilla dough: adjusted for modern measurements.

Using modern Masa Harina, the ratio is 1 cup of Masa to 1 "scant cup," approximately 237ml, and this ratio should yield about 10 tortillas of 5 inches in diameter.

In a large bowl, slowly add the water to the Masa and mix slowly by hand, Knead until the water is incorporated without any dry spots in your mixture. The Masa should be moist to the touch but not sticky.

Test the Masa dough by taking a small amount, about the size of a ping-pong ball, about 2 tablespoons, and flatten between your hands, if the edges of the dough cracks, add more water.

Next, take 2 tablespoons of dough, roll into a ball, and press flat between two pieces of parchment paper. You can also use a modern day tortilla press for this step.

Cooking the tortillas:

Under medium heat, place a flatten tortilla on a flat surface pan, use non-stick spray if you like, and heat for approximately 20 to 30-seconds, flip for another 20 to 30-seconds, and flip back to the original side for another 20 to 30-seconds.

Your tortillas may "puff up" during the cooking process, this is a sign that you are on the right path with your mixture, time, and temperature. However, if your tortillas did not puff up, no worries, you will still have a good and edible tortilla.


So, take a leap into the past and enjoy making and tasting the foods that the Conquistadors encountered in the new world.

FRYTOUR OF ERBES

The frytour of erbes is a fritter of herbs, fried to a golden brown, which can add a tasty crunch to your Malardis dish.

INGREDIENTS

8 tbs. of chopped or diced mixed green herbs: savory, parsley, marjoram, et cetera 2 cups flour 1 1/2 to 2 cupds lukewarm water 1/2 tsp salt 1 Tbsp. yeast Oil Honey to garnish

Dissolve the yeast into a bit of the water. Mix together the flour, herbs, and salt. Add the yeastmixture and enough of the water to the flour-herb mix to create a smooth, thick batter. Cover the batter and let it rise in a warm place until has doubled in size. To cook, drop by the spoon-full into hot oil and fry until light golden brown. Garnish the finished fritters with a drizzle of honey.
